Minutes of the Board Meeting

Friday, September 8, 2023 Venue: Gulf Coast Bird Observatory

President Mary Schwartz called the meeting to order at 1:01 pm.

Agenda: the agenda was unanimously accepted after a move to so do by Mickey and a second by Phil.

Minutes: A motion was made by Dick, seconded by Kim to approve the minutes of the July 14, 2023 meeting of the board. This motion passed unanimously.

Interim Motions: One motion was made and approved in the interim since the July 14th board meeting:

 Phil moved, and Ed seconded the motion that "The FOBWR will provide each new member of the Brazosport Chamber of Commerce a one-year membership" The motion passed unanimously with 9 yeas.

Grant Activity: Following the suggestion of Bryan and Bryar Johnson, two applications were submitted to the Galveston Bay Estuary Program for grants to stabilize sections of the Brazoria Wildlife Refuge.

- Cordgrass Planting for Coastal Resiliency requests \$200,000 to contract the planting of cordgrass to induce sediment accretion behind ~14.5 miles of breakwater along the intercoastal canal that passes through the refuge. Some planting by volunteers would be scheduled.
- The Salt Lake Native Marsh Shoreline Protection Project requests \$100,000 to contract Bathymetric Surveys to determine the best design for ~two miles of breakwater construction. Cordgrass would be planted to induce soil accretion behind the breakwater after the grant is completed; this planting is outside of the grant.

These applications were among the eleven submissions for grants from the GBEP. Applicants will present a ten-minute summary of their proposals to the GBEP Natural Resource Uses (NRU) Subcommittee on September 20th. Mary Schwartz and Bryar Johnson will represent FOBWR applications.

Land Acquisition: No update was presented at this meeting.

Refuge Update: Bryan

• Discussions continue with TDOT on issues relating to the widening of Highway 36 through refuge property. TDOT will construct two under-road culverts for drainage and for wildlife crossing. The refuge wants to ensure that the current hydrology is maintained. The value for the 16.3 acres that will be transferred to the State of Texas is under discussion; TDOT pays at least \$15,000 per acre. Those mitigation funds (+\$244,500) will be transferred to an account held by NFWF that currently contains \$146,000. This account is directed toward acquiring land in the Columbia bottomlands such as the 11-acre Poole tract on the corner of FM2918 and CR306. FOBWR has a \$10,000 grant from the Trull Foundation reserved toward the purchase of this tract.

- The refuge staff has yet to rationalize a list of projects for funding by FOBWR. Bryar has submitted his list, and Bryan has asked Jennifer Wilson and the Refuge Managers to look over Bryar's list to insure we have identified everything we are currently seeking funding for project support. The board will use this list to target grant and other funding. See new Action Item.
- Bryan noted that there were no bids for the BOEM call for leases of windfarms off the
 Texas coast. There was only one bid for a lease in the Gulf of Mexico south of Lake
 Charles. FOBWR had submitted a letter of concern to the BOEM on the impact of these
 windfarms on migrating and foraging birds.
- Bryan has asked Adrian Medellin to develop tract maps of Complex properties using the protocol of Onx Hunt.
- The partnership protocol between the Complex and the Brazoria County Parks
 Department on the adjoining Hanson County Park and refuge properties continues to be
 refined. Brian Frazer of the BCPD manages the oversite, which includes facilities for
 overnight camping. The county will install a new bridge across a creek transecting the
 properties.
- The complex is working with the US Corps of Engineers on permitting of the placement of dredging spoils on Big Boggy lands.
- Amanda McAdams, Assistant Direct of Refuges in Region 2 (Albuquerque), will be visiting the Complex in October.
- Congressman Randy Weber (and/or his staff) will be visiting the Complex in October to better understand issues facing the refuge, such as sea level rise. Issues of shortage of staff will likely be addressed.
- Traffic counters will be installed at the entrance to the Discovery Center road on the Brazoria NWR, and at the beginning of Ivy Road on the San Bernard NWR.

Action Items are listed at the end of these minutes. New action items are highlighted in yellow throughout these minutes. Items completed or removed are:

- Developing an outreach display designed for our 10'X15' canopy has been tabled.
- We don't need a Grant Solutions account until we get a grant from the Feds.
- Prior to this meeting, Josh Macklin of the Macklin Media Group presented their capabilities to develop market/fundraising strategies. They will present a proposal prior to the November 10th board meeting.
- Dick has published the FOBWR annual review on our website.

Refuge **Treasurer's Report**: The August, 2023 Financial Report is attached to the end of these minutes. Regina noted the \$1,000 interest from Merrill Lynch vs. the \$1 interest from TDECU, causing the transfer of money to TDECU only as needed.

The entry for Kathrine Kerstern is a court settlement and has been moved to the Law Enforcement fund.

Web and Social Media: Dick requested that we let him know of posting needs, such as notices of refuge walks.

Maintenance Committee: The summer heat has put a pause on maintenance projects.

Phil suggested that we begin restocking Cannan Bend with 10,000 minnows and 1,000 blue gill fish using Brazoria McGovern funds. Bass would be stocked in the spring. Brian will consult with Curtis for his concurrence with this plan.

Capital Projects:

- Oron's crew is taking a break from the summer heat. Everything on the to-do list has been completed including bench platforms on the Big Slough and Cannan Bend trails.
- Work on the Hudson Woods bird blind in on hold pending a decision by Curtis to dismantle/repair/or refine the current structure.
- Curtis will be consulted on the desirability of installing a pet waste station at the beginning of the San Bernard Oak Trail.

Birds of Prey: Phil will select birding books to be donated to school libraries during the spring season of school programs. A donor funds the cost of these books.

Phil and Dick will explore the idea of a wine & cheese fundraiser targeted to raise money for our Birds-of-Prey programs. They will look at giving programs at chambers of commerce events and soliciting funds at these meetings.

Membership: Mickey reported that we have 42 Life Members, 28 Annual Members, and 17 past members who are in arrears on this year's dues.

Outreach: Ruby noted that upcoming events include:

• XHX on Saturday, September 16th and 23rd. We will have a tent for reptiles and another for the Wingspan activity.

- On September 30th, Sea Center Texas will hold a Red Drum Day; we may have a booth although reptiles are not compatible with this theme.
- On October 8th, we will have our first booth, along with TMN-COT at the Brookside Farmers Market. The theme will emphasize the ocean and feature beach trash and sea turtles. We will have plastic fish for kids casting.
- KBR Kids Day in Houston will be on October 21st and feature our butterfly tent, reptiles, wingspan, and birds-of-prey.
- The Sea Center Spooktacular will be from 3:00 pm to 6:00 pm on Sunday, October 22nd.
- The Angleton Presbyterian Church will hold its annual fall festival on October 28th.

Monthly Walks: The next walk will October 19th 9:00 Hanson Park, Thursday; the November 17th walk is to be determined. December 7th will be at the Peach Creak unit of the McNeil tract. January will be a walk at Hudson Woods and the February walk will be at Cannan Bend.

Discovery Center Display: Display refurbishment is progressing, needing birds. Insect resistance is required. Chris will look into a "safe" moth ball that may help. Sun bleaching must be mitigated. Marty will look into window films that block UV, yet transmit most of the visible light spectrum. Cost may be prohibitive, but the view would be retained as opposed to the other option of installing blinds.

Brazosport Chamber of Commerce: Ed will provide the Brazosport Chamber with activities on our refuges and updated photos and contact information. Bryan will review Ed's draft before submitting to the chamber.
